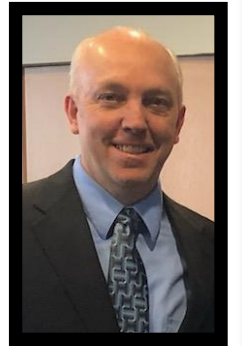


Appendix C: What They Said About Thurman Munson

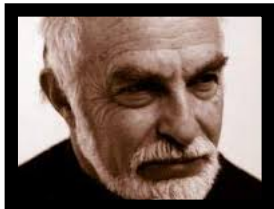

Thurman was the greatest catcher I ever threw to. While I was fortunate to play with many great players, he was my favorite teammate of my career."

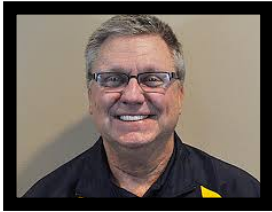

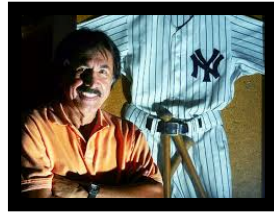
"When something needed to be said, he'd go to the individual. He always waited for the opportune time if something needed to be said, and he said it. Everyone respected him."

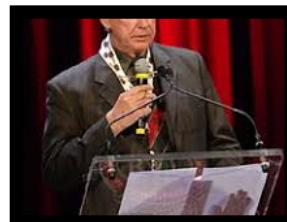

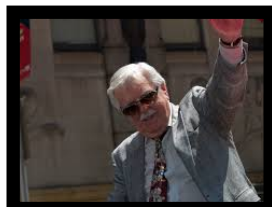
